# **Research In Progress**

**Neighborhood Levels of Institutional Trust in Richmond, VA** - Measurement, Impact, and Factors

- This project is focused on applying trust theory to the world of urban planning and community development. It will involve a mixed-methods approach with three distinct portions. These are loosely as follows...
  - Measurement Surveying the entire city of Roanoke and identifying high- and low-trust neighborhoods
  - Impact After identifying the amount of institutional trust for each neighborhood, statistical analysis will be done to determine to what extent trust can explain the outcomes of each neighborhood.
  - Factors Finally, the project will include at least two, and up to four, case studies
    of Richmond neighborhoods focused on further exploring the causes and
    complexities of trust dynamics in each place. The goal is to compare low- and
    high-trust neighborhoods as well as isolate racial dynamics.

# Government Control & The Racialization of Space in Richmond, VA

The purpose of this project is to examine how local governments exert control over their
populations through standard planning processes and whether there is differentiation in
this exertion along racial and cultural lines. The main data source for this study will be
public records from some of the public commissions and boards of the City of Richmond.
