America had more than one founding and more than one set of founders

New York Times opinion columnist Jamelle Bouie describes how abolitionists and opponents of slavery used the Declaration of Independence to justify their opposition to that practice. Scholars and leaders from 1776 to Abraham Lincoln nearly 100 years later utilized the Declaration to buttress their arguments against slavery. Bouie argues that our nation has effectively had more than one founding and that leaders contesting slavery using the tenets offered in the Declaration should be viewed as founders.

The Supreme Court killed Biden's Student Loan Forgiveness Plan. What does that mean for 2024?

Monica Potts analyzes the Supreme Court's 6-3 decision in this *FiveThirtyEight* piece to prevent implementation of President Biden's student loan forgiveness plan. The Court ruled that Biden could not use the 2003 HEROES Act to cancel \$10,000 in loans for targeted students without explicit Congressional approval. Potts contends that the ruling could have implications for the 2024 election because Biden had promised during his 2020 campaign to forgive a share of student debt, and some voters may therefore view this Court decision as a broken promise.

On the Fourth of July, a few reasons to feel encouraged about US democracy

Margaret Sullivan argues in this *Guardian* commentary that there are reasons to be hopeful about U.S. democracy, despite the nation's continuing mass shootings and recent Supreme Court decisions rejecting or limiting affirmative action, abortion rights, and student loan forgiveness. Sullivan cites the Electoral Count Act of 2022 as critical in preventing state legislatures from changing how electors can be chosen after an election, thus making it more difficult to challenge electoral votes, as occurred on January 6, 2021. Additionally, the Supreme Court recently upheld the Voting Rights Act by striking down Alabama's racial gerrymandering plan.
