# Key Highlights from the Past Year: A Note from the Director



June 2023

The 2022-2023 academic year has been an eventful one for the Institute and I seek to offer a brief overview here. Here are some highlights, grouped by topic for convenience:

## Institutional Changes

 The School of Public and International Affairs and the Institute formally transferred to the College of Liberal Arts and Human Sciences in July 2022 and that transition continues. We are delighted to have so many new colleagues with whom to develop and deepen ties.

## People

- We bade farewell to our long-time Fiscal and Research Associate Karen Boone, as she elected to retire. We all miss her.
- Two Institute leaders garnered new titles this year, reflecting their vital roles and institutional responsibilities. Mary Beth Dunkenberger is now serving as our Deputy Director and Dr. David Moore is now our Associate Director for Strategic Partnerships. Congratulations to both!
- While an old friend of IPG, we were very pleased this year to welcome Professor Robert (Bob) Leonard, Professor of Theatre Arts, to serve as a Senior Fellow in the Institute. It is a delight to have him affiliated with us in this way.

### People, cont.

- Dr. Andrea Briceno Mosquera joined us at the Institute as a Post-Doctoral Researcher in June for the coming year. She is working closely with Dr. Sharon Mastracci of the Center for Public Administration and Policy and with me, Mary Beth Dunkenberger and Dr. David Moore as she pursues her scholarly interests and is engaged in IPG's sponsored research projects. We are very happy to welcome Andrea and to work closely with Professor Mastracci.
- We were very pleased to learn that we will be hosting a University of Istanbul Ph.D. student, chosen in a national competition in Turkey, for a calendar year beginning in August 2023. Aziz Ardic will work closely with me and his advisory committee chair in Turkey as he develops his dissertation during his stay.
- We were also most pleased to be asked to host an exchange visitor in May 2023 from Mongolia, Khishi Enkhbayar, as a part of the National Committee on U.S. China Relations Professional Fellows program. Khishi is the cofounder and Secretary-General of the United Nations Association (UNA) of Mongolia. Our own Associate Director for Strategic Partnerships, David Moore, traveled to China some years ago as a Fellow in this program.

### **Publications**

- This year saw the publication of two books in the Institute series. Virginia Tech Publishing published the third and final volume in the RE: Reflections and Explorations series, edited by me and Dr. Lyusyena Kirakosyan, on February 8, 2023. Special thanks to Non-Resident Research Associate, Dr. Kirakosyan, for her outstanding work throughout this series.
- Meanwhile, Virginia Tech Publishing also published Conversations in Community Change: More Voices from the Field edited by Cathy Grimes and myself. This Conversations volume features edited interviews with a range of leaders engaged in efforts to promote democratic social and political change. The book includes interviews with a Nobel Peace Prize winner and a recipient of a MacArthur Foundation ("Genius Award") Fellowship, among many other notable professionals.

### Publications, cont.

- Professor of Political Science, Yannis Stivachtis and I, Eds., also published another book in April 2023 entitled Policy and Politics of the Syrian Refugee Crisis in Eastern Mediterranean States: National and Institutional Perspectives, E-International Relations, Bristol, U.K., 2023, featuring authors from the nations most affected by that still unfolding scenario. Non-Resident Research Associate, Dr. Neda Moayerian, co-authored two chapters in the book.
- I also edited a special issue of the journal Frontiers in Sustainable Food Systems with Professors Kim Niewolny, Laura Zanotti and Anna Erwin that resulted in 14 published articles.
- In addition to these works, our Institute faculty and research associates published peer-reviewed articles and book chapters related to communitybased participatory design, cross-sectoral partnership building, and community cultural development initiatives, among other topics. By any measure, IPG has had a productive year in published research!

## Sponsored Research

- One of the Institute's flagship research projects over the past few years has been the Roanoke Valley Connection to Care (C2C) grant, funded by the University of Baltimore's Center for Drug Policy and Prevention (CDPP) Combating Overdose Through Community-level Intervention Initiative (COCLI) and directed by PI Mary Beth Dunkenberger. The project has strengthened community partnerships, led to pilot innovations, and improved our understanding of the recovery ecosystem in the Roanoke Valley and West Piedmont regions for housing insecure people struggling with substance use disorder (SUD).
- IPG continues its long-running partnership with Total Action for Progress (TAP) on a number of projects. TAP is a community action agency serving the Roanoke Valley and Alleghany Highlands. Pl Dr. David Moore, Lara Nagle, and Liz Allen completed TAP's Triennial Community Needs Assessment, identifying the top priorities for low-income households within TAP's multi-locality service area to inform strategic planning.

### Sponsored Research, cont.

- Other projects with TAP this year included a program evaluation of TAP RESTORE, led by Lara Nagle (co-PI) and Mary Beth Dunkenberger (PI), which examined participant outcomes following their participation in the Re-Employment, Support, and Training for the Opioid Related Epidemic (RESTORE) program. RESTORE assisted women directly and indirectly affected by the opioid epidemic by providing career services and job training. Dr. David Moore (PI) is also supervising the implementation of a Pathway Home grant at TAP, providing pre- and post-release services to incarcerated individuals in need of employment assistance, transportation, housing, and other wraparound supports. Both of these projects are funded by the US Department of Labor.
- Led by Mary Beth Dunkenberger (PI), IPG faculty including Liz Allen (co-PI) and Laura York (co-PI) continue to support client tracking, needs assessments, and program evaluation for several Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) grants supporting behavioral health services provided by Mount Rogers Community Services and New River Valley Community Services.
- Among other new initiatives at IPG, Dr. David Moore and Lara Nagle serve as evaluators for a two-year NOAA-funded, multi-stakeholder collaboration with Carilion Clinic, Virginia Clinicians for Climate Action (VCCA), the City of Roanoke, and Virginia Tech to mobilize healthcare professionals, youth, and community groups to address the issue of heat-related illness due to climate change and warming summer temperatures, particularly in Roanoke's more vulnerable neighborhoods.

## Community Change Collaborative

• The Community Change Collaborative (CCC) is a faculty-advised, interdisciplinary graduate-student group at IPG that examines the methods, frameworks, and forces leading to community change. CCC has hosted a podcast on these topics, called Trustees Without Borders, engaging community change scholars and practitioners for more than a decade.

- The Collaborative hosted a number of faculty forums and guests this year, including Professors Marc Stern of our Department of Forest Resources and Environmental Conservation, Claire Cahen of Urban Affairs and Planning in SPIA, Jessica Taylor of our Department of History and Colorado State University Associate Professor of Political Science, David McIvor. Doug Jackson, the Arts and Culture Coordinator for the City of Roanoke, also joined us to talk about the Year of the Artist in Roanoke.
- CCC was also engaged in a successful effort this year along with partners, Reynolds Homestead and the Community Design Assistance Center (CDAC), as well as Professor Lisa Tucker's Interior Design studio, to assist the Patrick County-based nonprofit organization Envision Critz in creating and implementing a community consultation process to develop a design for a community cultural center in Critz. Special thanks to all of our partners in this exciting project!
- The Collaborative is also now working closely with a group called St. Paul's College for Life (SPC4Life) in Brunswick County, Virginia, which is comprised of alumni and friends of the now-closed St. Paul's College, long located in that community. SPC4Life is developing educational curricula for Brunswick County's most vulnerable young people and CCC is helping them with their governance strategy and strategic positioning.
- Finally, CCC/IPG is also collaborating on producing a new podcast series in partnership with VT Publishing and VT Libraries, called Social Science for the Public Good. Interspersing interviews with prominent theorists and explanations designed to provide context, the series will seek to communicate not only the content of social science theorizations but also how they are relevant for those seeking to promote change. As I close, I would be remiss not to thank all of those who have worked with or supported the Institute this year. You are, we realize, why we exist when all is said and done. Thank you.



# Roanoke Valley Connection to Care (C2C)

2019-2023

Key Investigators: Mary Beth Dunkenberger (PI), Laura York, (co-PI), Lara Nagle (co-PI), Elizabeth Allen (co-PI)

The C2C project is a novel multi-stakeholder intervention using referral, crisis response resources, case management capacities, and backpacks equipped with potentially life-saving tools to address goals of: 1) timely referral of persons experiencing or at-risk of overdose or other substance use health-related consequences; 2) reduction in overdose and relapse; and 3) connecting consumers to appropriate harm reduction, treatment and recovery programs. # C2C Housing First Toolkit and Recovery Housing Summit

# Total Action for Progress (TAP) Triennial Community Needs Assessment

# Peer Empowered Addiction Recovery Living (PEARL) for Pregnant and Postpartum Women

IPG provides evaluation and technical assistance for the PEARL program of Piedmont Community Services (PCS). PEARL provides mothers with a 6-12 month residential stay in safe, supportive recovery housing, including access to counseling, case management, office-based addiction treatment (OBAT), and wrap-around supports. Partners with the Virginia Center for Housing Research, including Andrew McCoy, advised on the redevelopment of the Grace House for PEARL. Learn More



## **TAP Pathway Home**

Dr. Moore is working with the community action agency Total Action for Progress (TAP) to manage a Pathway Home grant in partnership with local jails serving the Roanoke Valley. The \$3 million Pathway Home grant is from the U.S. Department of Labor to provide job training and re-entry services to previously incarcerated people. This proposal was one of 18 initiatives in 14 states selected to participate in the \$50 million program. Learn More

IPG serves as the lead evaluator on the Heat Ready, Roanoke! project funded by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). The project is led by Carilion Clinic in partnership with Virginia Tech, Virginia Clinicians for Climate Action (VCCA), and the City of Roanoke to enhance environmental literacy about extreme heat and health, and to strengthen climate resilience. The goal of the FRU team is to identify, pursue, and provide a seamless process in maximizing resources from federal entitlement, state programs, and families per local program policies to reduce the local costs of providing services to children in foster care or CSA services while optimizing support for affected individuals. # Community Change Collaborative Academic Year in Review

The <u>Community Change Collaborative (CCC)</u> is a graduate-level initiative of IPG that examines the methods, frameworks, and forces shaping community development, approaches to community engagement, and how to build sustainable, cross-sectoral partnerships. CCC's interdisciplinary research scope ranges from the local to the international, including a variety of mixed methods approaches to connect theory and praxis. Members meet weekly, host guest speaker and faculty forum series, and help to facilitate community-engaged projects focused on democratic and political agency and cultural and community development.



CCC is also affiliated with a peer-reviewed, graduate student journal called <u>Community</u> <u>Change</u>, which recently launched its fourth issue focused on Transmission and Transition. The journal is open access and supported by VT Publishing.

Community Change promotes quality graduate student publications and educates graduate students about the editorial, peer review, and scholarly publication process through applied learning. The journal was launched in 2017 by members of Community Voices, what is now CCC.






